HOMESCHOOLING

Weighing the pros and cons

1. Homeschooling is an **alternative** to private and **public** education. A homeschooled student does not attend classes at a school. In most cases, parents homeschool their own children at their own homes as well as in their community.
2. Parents have different reasons for homeschooling their kids. Some parents are concerned about food **allergies** at school. Others are worried about **bullying**. Many don't approve of the quality of public education in their region. Some don't want their kids to take long bus rides.
3. Homeschooling has many **benefits**. Families can set their own schedules. Students can focus on the topics that interest them most. Some kids learn things hands-on better than from textbooks. Homeschooled families also develop close **bonds**.
4. There are some **drawbacks** to homeschooling. Firstly, homeschooling is a financial **sacrifice** for most families. One parent becomes an unpaid teacher and may have to leave his or her job. Homeschooled kids also have to make a special effort to socialize by joining teams and clubs. Many homeschool families **face criticism** from family and friends. They have to answer questions about their homeschooling decision **on a daily basis**.
5. Every family homeschools differently. Some parents create a daily schedule. Others let the children take the lead. Volunteering, religious studies, project work, and play may all be part of the day.
